

De Lima—De Cespedes,

Miss Gloria de Cespedes, a daughter of Carlos Manuel de Cespedes, the first President of the Cuban republic, and Charles Abon de Lima, a member of the firm of D. A. de Lima of this city, were married yesterday afternoon at the Hotel Waldorf. Justice Roger A. Prior of the Supreme Court performed the ceremony.

The bride and mother lived in Paris until the beginning of the Cuban revolution. Carlos Manuel de Cespedes, the bride's brother, then fitted out an expedition to Cuba, and his sister and mother came here so as to be as near as possible to him. Mr. de Cespedes has been appointed Governor of a Cuban province by the Provisional Government of the Cuban republic.

Brief Strike on a Brooklyn Railroad.

Sixty-five pavers and rammers employed by the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company struck yesterday. About a year ago the wages of the men were reduced and their hours of labor increased, but they got steady employment. Yesterday the company turned over the work to a contractor, who went to Pierce's Hall in Myrtle avenue, where the men were assembled, and they returned to work on the understanding that they would receive the usual union scale of wages.
