**27 Persons Transferred**

in all the houses of correction in this state and 10 prisoners were transferred to the Suffolk county house of correction. Eight of them were sent there from the Concord reformatory and two from the Sherburne prison.

"I know that most of these were active men. I know positively that they were not insane. Two of the transferred prisoners were women. What their condition was I cannot say.

"In our report we have called attention repeatedly to the condition of the buildings and stated the dimensions of the cells. We said this was a small place to confine a human being. For anybody to pretend that the bad condition of the men is due to any other cause than the arrangement of the cells is simply silly.

"I will state that the commissioners never have knowingly transferred any prisoner who was insane to the house of correction from any other prison.

"A transfer is never made until the case has been thoroughly investigated.

"I know all the superintendents, and I know that they would not try to get rid of bad men by foisting them upon the house of correction."

**ERRATIC EDWARD DE LIMA**

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—The marriage of young Edward De Lima has created almost as great a surprise as did his mysterious disappearance in January, 1892.

The bride, Miss Ruby Gurney of Saco, Me, is the daughter of Silas Gurney, who, until 1884, was the proprietor of the Tremont house in Boston.

The ceremony was performed at 5 o'clock Wednesday evening by Judge McAdam of the superior court in the room of the Fifth av hotel known as Gen Grant's parlor.

The wedding was kept very quiet, and was attended only by members of the families of the bride and groom. The couple started on a tour of the southern states immediately after the ceremony. Upon their return they will live at 1 West 81st st.

The bridegroom created a sensation about two years ago by going out to make a call and failing to return. He had on his person valuable jewelry and \$1000 in money when he left. Several months later he was found in Paris by an acquaintance. The family's excuse for the young man's action was temporary mental aberration.

Since his return he has attended regularly to his duties as a member of the firm of D. A. De Lima & Co, South American merchants.
